

Starting in September we will begin offering a monthly worship service on the fourth Sunday of each month. This service will be а "contemplative Eucharist." What is "contemplative Eucharist" you might ask. The "Eucharist" element is obvious. It is a service that will include a celebration of Holy Communion. The "contemplative" aspect of this service is that there will be extended times of silence and music within the service to offer participants opportunities for silent reflection.

The service will begin at 6:00 pm. Before the service begins there will be fifteen minutes of meditative music played in the nave as people gather for worship. The music played will be chants or hymns that come from the earliest traditions of the Church Catholic. Some will come from the Orthodox tradition, others from the Roman Catholic and Anglican traditions.

The service will begin with opening sentences and a hymn. The hymn will often be a familiar hymn that is set to a new musical arrangement. Two readings with a psalm in between will follow. The psalm will be chanted or sung by the congregation and/or

musicians. After both the first reading and the gospel lesson a short time of meditative silence will follow. In keeping with the practice of *Lectio Diving* after the



gospel lesson there will be a time for group reflection on the lessons that have been read.

Continuing the practice of Lectio Divina, after the group reflection there will be time for individual reflection on the lessons during the Prayers of the People. This will be a time of ten to fifteen


minutes where people are free to walk around the worship space and enter into a time of prayer in a number of ways. A person can remain seated and simply reflect on the day's readings and our sharing. There will be prayer stations placed around the nave with short devotionals based on the scenes depicted in our stained glass windows. For those who wish to remain in their seats during this time there will be congregational singing of Taize songs or other simple praise choruses.

The service will conclude with the celebration of Holy Communion. It will be celebrated at an altar in the midst of the congregation. As you can see, this is a liturgical service with a few twists. We are, after all, a liturgical church and in the design of this service we wanted to stay in identity. keeping with that However, we also wanted to experiment with a worship experience that was different than what we offer on Sunday morning. It is the hope that this service will be "Traditional enough to be trustworthy, Innovative enough to be relevant."

By the way, did I mention incense?



> We have an obligation to provide for ourselves and our families and to maintain a way of life that respects our own dignity as persons. Yet we must recognize that most of in North **America** have opportunities and resources at our disposal that other people will never have. The following is a true story that illustrates the principles of Christian stewardship.

> When I was a young boy growing up in Virginia, my parents were dirt poor. Yet because of a hard work and a large garden, we always had food on the table. Whenever a hungry traveller knocked on our door asking for a hand out, they never left hungry. Often, they were provided dinner, a bed for the night and breakfast before they departed the

next morning. They were treated with the same courtesy and dignity as any other visitor. At the time, I did not understand the significance of my parent's actions. Only later did I understand that they were teaching their children who our "neighbors" are and at the same time being responsible stewards of God's gifts. To them, it was their "way of life." Does God expect any less from us today?

### AUGUST VESTRY REPORT By Lucy Germany

Concerns for efficiency of operation surfaced in a number of areas as the vestry met for its August deliberations. Major topics for consideration ranged from improvement in the method of handling cash receipts, to concerns for security of church buildings, possible nave sound system modification, completion of exterior sign lighting, and what might be viewed as the major topic—changes to front row seating in the nave, and possible moving of the organ to achieve the goal of bringing the choir closer to the congregation. Both of these stirred a variety of comments ranging from the importance of achieving maximum sound volume-seen as a benefit to the whole congregation; the need to honor generous pew donations given by parishioners; the advantage of having more flexible seating in the nave, particularly for special musical events and the ability to offer other forms of worship.

The vestry approved a more efficient handling of Sunday service receipts which would involve removing the money directly into the vault within the sacristy, rather than continuing the routine counting by appointed vestry members. The change would then remove the funds from the vault the following morning to be taken directly to the bank, thus reducing the possibility of risk in the handling process. A second change regarding handling of funds—the creation of a money market account for endowment funds-- was approved, thus eliminating reconciliation of funds between endowment fund and church books.

Finance chair Barney Jones said, though, there was no good news as to incoming funds, still all bills have been paid and "we don't owe anybody money." Upbeat financial news, however, involved increase in offerings during the latter part of July and the completion of "a good audit". Jones also outlined recent security measures involving bids for installation of protective fencing for one of the more vulnerable air conditioning units.

Concern was voiced for the possible inadequacy of the nave's sound system which has been called "a problem" by some parishioners. Training people to regulate the system to achieve maximum efficiency was seen as a solution to be pursued.

The majority of input focused on the choir's physical location during worship for which strong opinions were voiced. The pending questions focused on whether the location of the organ be altered, whether the choir should be moved permanently to the front of the nave and whether the first two rows of pews on both sides should be removed to accommodate the organ's new location. A "straw poll" vote of vestry members to make provision to remove the first two rows of pews and have seating placed there when needed, favored the measure which would thus enable alternative worship to take place. It was also noted that the change could be reversed should it be required.

Fr. Kevin also expressed thanks for all who have shared their personal stories with him. He noted that the input "emphasizes the value of this church and its primary identity in this community."

## Move The Organ? What In The World Were You Thinking?

During the month of June we experimented with the question of whether to move the choir seating to the nave. Coupled with that question was whether to move the organ console to the nave as well. Our Vestry has discussed the merits of the proposed change at every Vestry meeting from May through this past August. After thoroughly discussing the changes and much prayer and discernment the Vestry decided to keep the organ in its present location.

Through my discussions with the Vestry and with Bill Bane, the Director of Music, I have decided at this time to return the choir to the traditional position behind the altar. Some have asked why we would even entertain the question of moving the choir or even think of moving the organ. The question of moving the organ was driven by the practicality of the organ console being close to the choir if the choir was seated in the nave. The question of moving the choir was motivated by two considerations. The first was a pastoral concern. Some members of the choir feel very disconnected from the congregation due to their seating behind the altar.

The second motivation for moving the choir was a desire to enhance our worship through greater participation of the congregation in singing. The seating of the choir in the nave did enhance the quality of our worship. Upon polling the choir members, however, and asking the Vestry members to solicit feedback from parishioners about this change, it became apparent there wasn't unanimity about this decision. Many aren't ready to make the change in the choir's location at this time.

One further issue discussed during these past few months was the removal of the first two rows of pews in the nave. This change was recommended by the Vestry and it is important to communicate to the parish the rationale behind that decision. The first reason, which is no longer pertinent, was to provide an appropriate space for the choir to sit in the nave. The second reason was to provide a better space for the many musical events that we host at Trinity Church. The third reason is to create additional space in the nave for alternative worship services.

Our nave is by far the most beautiful setting for worship in Longview and maybe in all East Texas. The gothic architecture, superior acoustics and fabulous stained glass windows immediately transports a person into the presence of God. This glorious space deserves to be used for the worship of God on more occasions than three hours on Sunday morning and thirty minutes on Wednesday. However, one of the limitations of our space is the inflexibility of the seating. Removing the first two rows of pews gives a modicum of space to explore the possibilities of alternative worship services at Trinity. A second alternative worship service is going to be offered on the fourth Sunday evening of each month beginning in September. The service is called *Perichoresis*.

Change is never easy and it is difficult adapting to new things. However, if we aren't willing to change in response to a changing cultural context we will become irrelevant. Some on Vestry and in the parish have been dismayed that we have spent so much time talking about the removal of two rows of pews. In fact one person commented that this issue has been discussed for years at Trinity. I see it in a more positive light. I see these hard discussions, even with the emotion that surrounds them, as the wrestling of a healthy church that is asking the hard question of how to balance a love of tradition with being culturally relevant. I would suggest to you that an appropriate tag line for Trinity could be, "Traditional enough to be trustworthy, Innovative enough to be relevant."
