On Independence Day: Forming a More Perfect Union

In the Episcopal Church, we expect people to participate in our democracy. Although the Church does occasionally take a stand on issues of social concern, we obey the law and avoid endorsing candidates or parties. But we expect our members to go out and get involved. Whether that means voting our conscience, working for and giving to the candidates and causes we care about, or participating in vigorous public debate, we believe that faithful citizenship matters. That being said, not everything is permissible. Where do we draw the line? Well, we draw it, when we reject violence against people—including verbal violence directed against our fellow human beings. We expect that, for Christians, Jesus and the Gospel will always come first. Jesus and his love will shape how we treat each other.

As the Fourth of July approaches (our parish celebration is on Sunday, July 7, see the announcement in this issue of the *Trumpet*), I am reminded of the blood that men and women have shed—both to win our independence and to keep the torch of freedom lit for future generations. I am also reminded that our Republic is an unfinished project, what the Founders called an "experiment in ordered liberty." Here, I think especially about the struggle against racism—the original sin of this country. I am reminded of Martin Luther King's bold appeal to the unfulfilled promises of our nation—to the rights and inspiring words in our founding documents. As a Baptist minister in the prophetic Black tradition, King also appealed to the Old Testament prophets and the Gospel of Jesus, as he sought dignity and freedom for African-Americans. I am reminded of parallel, ongoing struggles for freedom among women and workers and other racial and ethnic groups.

In spite of these struggles (and, in some ways, because of them), America has been a beacon of hope for much of the world. It is our job to protect and extend the freedoms we enjoy, until *no one is left behind*. Part of how we do that is by keeping faith with the Constitution as the framework for our common life, protecting the right to vote and civil liberties, and by continuing to fight for justice and the common good. We do it by asking God (in the words of "America the Beautiful") to "mend our every flaw." We do it by refusing to settle for anything less than the ways of Jesus that lead us to a more neighborly existence.

As citizens of a democracy, we must realize that our perspective is fallible and limited—that even our most passionate convictions are subject to correction over time. God has given us our neighbors to "mend our every flaw" and teach us how to love. That's why we have freedom of speech and of the press, of assembly and peaceful protest, and the "free exercise of religion." It's why our Constitution commits us to equal protection of the laws and the right to vote. The role of Christians in this jumbled, noisy, democratic conversation is to insist that loving our neighbors comes first. In our country today, we need more hands raised up in prayer and stretched out in love. We need less violence, hatred, and division. Without the love of neighbor, our experiment in ordered liberty will fail. As Dr. King once taught us, "we must learn to live together as brothers and sisters, or we will perish together as fools."

As we celebrate our Independence, let us pray for our country and all who call this land our home. God bless America!

MISSION OF THE MONTH

Kilgore College- Longview Student Food Pantry

For Kilgore College students struggling to pay for tuition and books, it's sometimes hard to put food on the table. A new program launched in 2017 aims to address that issue. Campus officials have set up a food pantry within the Duvall Student Center for students who are struggling.

The College and University Food Bank Alliance, which focuses on promoting campus programs to alleviate food insecurity and hunger at universities in the United States, said post-secondary enrollment patterns show more and more "nontraditional" students on college campuses. Many students now are supporting families and working full time while attending college. These students are often food insecure or one missed paycheck away from being food insecure.

We are proud to help in this effort. The July loose plate offering will go to help purchase food and other necessary living supplies for Kilgore College students in need. A Genius in Plain Sight by Mother Vivian Shelby

Traveling is when I meet the most amazing people and this trip was no different. My husband and I took a vacation in Gloucester, Massachusetts in May. Being near or on the ocean is one of my favorite places, feeling God's presence in the wind and the waves.

We decided to go on an evening sail on the Ardelle – a 58' wooden Pinky Schooner. We were greeted by the Captain, Harold -who was wearing torn shorts, a baseball cap and barefoot – and his apprentice, Charlie – a twenty-something putting in his training hours to one day become a captain himself. Harold introduced us to the boat and invited everyone to assist in pulling up the sails. Watching the wooden hoops that slide up the mast as the sails go up was amazing. Only then could we feel mother nature take the boat to full speed, which was breathtaking. It was a beautiful evening, and the wind took us out from the bay into the Atlantic Ocean as the sky turned a brilliant orange.

Harold then began visiting with each of us, showing us a large book of photographs documenting the building of the Ardelle. Turns out, he built her in six-months from 2010-2011. Not only that, this humble, unassuming man was awarded the Masters of Traditional Arts distinction in 2012 by the National Endowment for the Arts as the best craftsman of original Essex wooden schooners in the world!

He learned boatbuilding from his father, who was a doctor, and small wooden boats were his hobby. In 1996, a man commissioned Harold to design and build an authentic 64.5' wooden Fredonia Style Schooner. One had not been built in over 50 years, so Harold had to study photographs, get advice, and rely on his instincts as a boatbuilder. Many people said it simply could not be done and definitely not in the six-month timeframe her owner wanted.

Harold A. Burnham proved them all wrong, and it began an incredible journey. He is dedicated to passing his passion on to the next generations of boat designers, builders, crew, and passengers. If you are ever in Massachusetts and want to experience the glory of God's creation, there is no better place, vessel, or captain. Even the seagulls know him.
